Monday

Bold Beginnings

Detective stories, mysteries and thrillers often have a bold beginning to lure readers into the story. We will look at how stories can start in medias res where readers have to pick things up from a story already in progress. We will also look at how to hook readers with an intriguing premise or set up that demands attention.

Tuesday

First Person Narrative

Stories with a strong point of view is often intriguing as it allows writers to get into the head of the characters. Today we will jump around different characters and try to tell the same story with different points of view.

Wednesday

Hard-hitting Headlines

We will do some more specific genre writing by looking at newspaper articles, blogs and other published news formats to help tell the story. This will help us tell the story from a different angle and be more objective in our storytelling.

Thursday

In-between the Lines

One of the hallmarks of a good detective story is the snappy banter between characters. Good dialogue is a great way to give insight into character, convey a lot of exposition and speed up the pace of a story. We will look at several situations where the back and forth between characters make a lot of impact.

Friday

Wrapping Up the Story

Today we will be wrapping up our detective story and try to tie up all the loose ends. Who was the culprit, who were the red herrings, what will happen to the characters and how will the mystery be resolved? It is time to make some strong choices in our storytelling and make sure we resolve the story in a memorable way.
