A world of stories to tell

rom the Scottish tale of the glimmering king fish to the Korean fable of Cho, the hard-working farm boy, Andrea Darvill has gathered some wonderful stories from around the world to share with young audiences and those young-at-heart.

And Darvill's storytelling is definitely more than just a listening experience. Determined to get her audience involved, she uses all sorts of stage skills and visual elements in her shows.

At one storytelling workshop at this year's Faust Festival, Darvill hopped on stage to the sound of beating drums before captivating her young audience with her African dancing.

Darvill considers the retelling of stories that she herself heard in different parts of the world, to be a wonderful gift to others.

"It's not just me the performer, it's you the audience who has to go out and tell the story. Don't keep them to yourself," she says.

Born in Toronto, a multicultural city on the east coast of Canada, Darvill grew up experiencing different cultures. This fuelled her desire to explore the world.

"We were exposed to so many [cultures]. And we grew up hearing them," she says.

Telling interesting and catchy stories requires more than just narration, explains Darvill.

would also help make you a better storyteller, she adds.

Of course the experiences she has had while travelling have helped make her a more engaging storyteller. But having seen so many vibrant and exciting places, it's difficult for her to know where, precisely, is her favourite part of the world.

"I do love diversity, I love contrast," she says.

Sometimes it's nice walking around the IFC Tower and shopping in the mall, but once in a while she would like to stay in small towns, near trees and mountains.

It's not perfect, once you travel. You like a little bit of everything and no place has that," she reflects. "So I kind of like the world."

But Darvill, who has enjoyed visiting so many different places and meeting so many different people, has found a place to settle; a small yet vibrant town in Australia that people from around the world visit at different times of the year.

"I'm settled now. I have a house, I have a cat, I'm settled in Australia."

Despite now having a base, Darvill believes the reason she's still single is because she has been travelling too much.
